My main assignments and projects throughout the internship included policy analysis over bills related to higher education and taxation, data analysis for decisions related to transportation, higher education, and property taxes, and drafting and editing final documents for the Governor and his senior staff to assist in final policy decisions. *In addition to the substantive* workload, I also was able to enjoy the incredible opportunities Austin provided, which included two policy conference, several legislative receptions, and a gala.
